Iceland's First Full-day Women's Strike in 48 Years Aims to Close Pay Gap

A. Tens of thousands of women and non-binary people in Iceland, including the prime minister, are set to participate in a historic strike on Tuesday—the first of its kind in nearly 50 years. The strike aims to draw attention to persistent issues such as the gender pay gap and widespread gender-based and sexual violence in the country. This marks the first full-day women's **strike** since the 1975 "kvennafrí," a **pivotal** event that led to significant societal changes, including the election of the world's first female president.

B. Despite Iceland's global reputation as a leader in gender equality, some professions still witness a 21% wage gap between men and women. Additionally, over 40% of women in Iceland have experienced genderbased or sexual **violence**. Strike organizers emphasize that jobs traditionally associated with women, such as cleaning and caregiving, remain **undervalued** and underpaid.



C. The strike was organized by about 40 grassroots organizations under the slogan "Kallarðu þetta jafnrétti?" (You call this equality?), calls for closing the gender pay gap by disclosing wages in femaledominated professions. It also demands action against gender-based and sexual violence, focusing on holding **perpetrators** accountable. Unlike the 1975 strike, Tuesday's event includes women and nonbinary individuals, reflecting a collective fight against the patriarchal system.

D. Approximately 25,000 people are expected to attend an event in Reykjavík, making it potentially Iceland's largest women's strike. Prime Minister Jakobsdóttir expressed solidarity, expecting the prime minister's office to cease operations during the strike. The organizers stress the need to challenge the perception of Iceland as an "equality paradise" when faced with substantial **wage gaps** and high rates of gender-based violence.

E. In connecting the dots between violence against women and the undervaluation of women's work, the strike underscores the multifaceted challenges women face in Icelandic society. Drífa Snædal, on the executive committee of the women's strike, emphasizes the link between increased access to pornography among children and violence against women, asserting that both women's status and their monetary value in the workplace contribute to sexual violence.

F. The strike also addresses the inadequacies of the justice system in handling sexually violent crimes, as women express a loss of patience with the current state of affairs. Despite global movements like #MeToo, women in Iceland find themselves unable to rely on the justice system for resolution. As Iceland prepares for this **groundbreaking** event, it prompts reflection on the global struggle for gender equality. The strike, born out of a grassroots movement, serves as a powerful reminder that the fight for true equality requires ongoing efforts, even in countries recognized for their progress. In a world **grappling** with various challenges, the need for a free press remains paramount, as emphasized by the Guardian's plea for support to ensure its continued operation. As we approach the new year, the call for solidarity and activism echoes, underscoring the importance of collective action in shaping a **m**ore equitable future.






